LOCATION/DIRECTIONS:

From the West - (Aurora)

Take US 50 to Walnut Street in Lawrenceburg. Turn right onto Walnut and proceed to High Street. Turn right on High Street and proceed to Mary Street. The Dearborn County Courthouse is on the corner.

From the East (I-275)

Proceed on US 50 to Walnut Street in Lawrenceburg. Turn left onto Walnut Street. Proceed to High Street and turn right. Proceed to Mary Street. The Dearborn County Courthouse is on the corner.

Low-cost, public transportation is available to the Courthouse via Catch-A-Ride at 432-3960 or toll-free at 800/330-7603.

PARKING:

Parking is available in the Courthouse parking lot across the street from the front entrance of the Courthouse. Additional parking is located on West High Street and on Mary Street.

AVAILABLE FACILITIES:

Restrooms are located on the first floor of the Court House. A public telephone is located in the basement left of the elevator. **NO CELL PHONES, ELECTRONIC DEVICES, FOOD OR DRINK ARE PERMITTED IN THE COURT ROOM.**

LENGTH OF SERVICE:

The length of service is until the assigned trial is complete.

JUROR COMPENSATION:

The State Legislature has authorized the Court to pay jurors \$15.00 per day, plus .44 per mile round trip, from your residence. Those who are selected to serve on the jury will receive \$40.00 per day plus mileage. If requested, you will be provided with proof of attendance to your employer.

ATTIRE:

Business casual. Due to the environment changes, a sweater or jacket may be desired.

SECURITY:

You will be required to go through a metal detector upon entering the Courthouse.

AUXILIARY AIDS:

Hearing-impaired equipment can be provided upon request.

MEALS:

Prior to being selected as a juror, you should be prepared to provide your own meals. If you are selected as a juror, meals and refreshments will be provided.

CHILDREN:

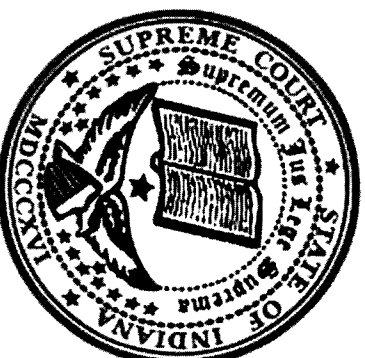
DO NOT BRING CHILDREN. Children are not permitted in the courtroom.

Are You Eligible?

Defendants must plead guilty to be eligible for the Accountability, Change, and Community (A.C.C.) Drug Court services. Legal and Treatment eligibilities include:

- Dearborn or Ohio County, Indiana citizen or employed in said counties
- Pending felony or felony probation violation in Dearborn County or Ohio County, Indiana Courts
- Serious addiction to alcohol and/or drugs
- Willingness to undergo random drug testing, submit to home searches, agree to follow all of the judge's orders, obtain and maintain full time employment, and attend all treatment/counseling sessions
- Cognitive ability to understand and voluntarily participate in the individual treatment plan
- Complete an assessment and have identified treatment needs that can be met by the program
- Not possess a propensity for violent behavior
- Willingness and desire to actively and voluntarily participate in and complete all services provided
- Not suffer from a severe mental illness other than alcohol and/or drug addiction
- Eligible under IC § 33-23-16

What is the Dearborn County Accountability, Change, and Community (A.C.C.)

Drug Court?

Eligible drug-addicted persons may be sent to Drug Court in lieu of traditional justice system case processing. Drug Court keeps individuals in treatment long enough for treatment to work, while supervising them closely. For a minimum term of one year, participants are:

- provided with intensive treatment and other services required to stay clean and sober;
- held accountable by the Drug Court judge for meeting their obligations to the court, society, themselves, and their families;
- regularly and randomly tested for drug use;
- required to appear in court frequently so that the judge may review their progress; and
- rewarded for doing well or sanctioned when they do not live up to their obligations.

Drug Courts reduce drug use. Drug Courts reduce crime. Drug Courts save money. Drug Courts restore lives. Drug Courts save children and reunite families.

Identification of Potential Participants

Referrals are made to Dearborn County A.C.C. Court Coordinator. The Coordinator screens the referrals to

determine if eligible. If the Coordinator determines the veteran is eligible, the information is forwarded to the Deputy Prosecuting Attorney who is assigned to Veterans Court, to consider a potential plea offer including A.C.C. Court. A criminal defense attorney, deputy prosecuting attorney, or probation officer, may always refer an individual to the A.C.C. Court for consideration.

A New Beginning

When a participant completes all A.C.C. Court requirements, a graduation ceremony is held. Remarkably, numerous A.C.C. Drug Court participants' parents have echoed the same words at the graduation ceremony, ***"I am so proud of you. Thank you. I feel like I have my son (daughter) back."***

A.C.C. Court works with individuals—not to change who they are—but to change them back to the caring, productive, and law abiding person they once were, before drugs took control of their lives.

Judge Cleary emphasizes: ***"Recovery isn't something you can be forced into; you have to truly want it for yourself. It's a battle, and it's an important battle to win."***

A.C.C. Program Structure

Progress will be closely monitored and reported to the Judge. Participants should expect to be tested at least twice a week, but as often as daily if necessary to achieve sobriety.

Phase I: For a minimum of 90 days, must appear in Court once per week, will wear an ankle bracelet, submit to random drug testing, attend two group counseling sessions per week, one bi-weekly individual session, three 12 step meetings per week, meet with case manager once per week, must have four consecutive weeks of negative drug tests, and proof of a sponsor.

Phase II: For a minimum of 90 days, must appear in Court once bi-weekly, one group per week, one bi-weekly individual, case manager bi-weekly, 8 weeks of negative drug tests, obtain employment, relapse prevention plan.

Phase III: For a minimum of 180 days, must appear in Court once a month, one group bi-weekly, meet case manager once a month, 16 weeks of negative drug tests, maintain employment, 40 hours community service, all fees paid, long-term aftercare plan.

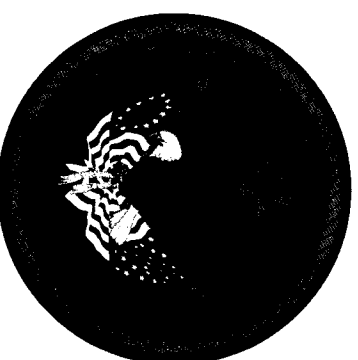
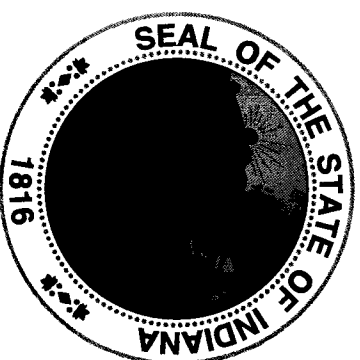
Phase IV: After program graduation, complete at least one year of probation or long as the plea agreement requires.

Are You Eligible?

Defendants must plead guilty to be eligible for the Veterans Treatment Court services. Legal and Treatment eligibilities include:

- Dearborn or Ohio County, Indiana citizen
- Pending felony or felony probation violation in Dearborn County or Ohio County, Indiana Courts
- United States Veteran of Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, or Coast Guard (Active, Reserve, or National Guard)
- Discharged from the military with an Honorable or General, Under Honorable Conditions
- characterization of service
- Eligible and access to Veterans Administration (VA) healthcare
- Diagnosed with trauma, mental health, and/or substance abuse and related co-occurring disorders
- Cognitive ability to understand and voluntarily participate in the individual treatment plan
- Complete an assessment by the Cincinnati Veterans Administration and have identified treatment needs that can be met by the program
- Willingness and desire to actively and voluntarily participate in and complete all services provided
- Eligible under IC § 33-23-16-13

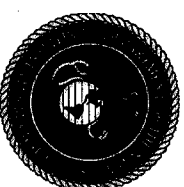

What is the Dearborn County

Veterans Treatment Court?

Indiana is home to nearly 500,000 United States veterans. Some veterans return home after discharge and find it difficult to transition back to civilian life, due to physical and mental wounds such as Traumatic Brain Injury and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Some veterans self medicate with alcohol or drugs. Some are suicidal. The mission of Dearborn County Veterans Treatment Court is to restore honor, rehabilitate and assist veterans in leading a productive and law abiding life, and to promote a safer and stronger community.

Identification of Potential Participants

Referrals are made to Dearborn County Veterans Treatment Court both formally and informally. Formally, the Dearborn County Law Enforcement Center corrections officers ask every person who is booked into the jail if he/she is a United States veteran. If the person is a veteran, the documentation is forwarded to the Veterans Court Coordinator. The Coordinator screens the veterans to determine if eligible. If the Coordinator determines the veteran is eligible, the information is forwarded to the Deputy Prosecuting Attorney who is assigned

to Veterans Court, to consider a potential plea offer including Veterans Court.

Informally, a criminal defense attorney, deputy prosecuting attorney, or probation officer, may always refer a veteran to the Veterans Court Coordinator for consideration.

A New Beginning

“With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the nation’s wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan...” President Lincoln’s promise to care for those who shall have borne the battle ought to be one of our greatest privileges as American citizens. Without the sacrifices of our veterans, our nation would certainly not be as we know it today.

Joining the Dearborn County Veterans Treatment Court means you want to improve your life by working closely with the treatment team to achieve your recovery goals, develop job skills, connect to available VA services, rebuild family and community ties, live a drug and crime free life, stabilize your living situation, and reconnect with positive veteran peers.

Program Structure

Your progress will be closely monitored and reported to the Judge. You will be assigned a peer mentor, a United States veteran, who has volunteered to provide guidance to you as you work through this program.

Phase I: For a minimum of 90 days, must appear in Court once per week, will wear an ankle bracelet, submit to random drug testing, attend two group counseling sessions per week, one bi-weekly individual session, three 12 step meetings per week, meet with case manager once per week, and must have four consecutive weeks of negative drug tests.

Phase II: For a minimum of 90 days, must appear in Court once bi-weekly, one group per week, one bi-weekly individual, case manager bi-weekly, 8 weeks of negative drug tests, obtain employment, relapse prevention plan.

Phase III: For a minimum of 180 days, must appear in Court once a month, one group bi-weekly, meet case manager once a month, 16 weeks of negative drug tests, maintain employment, 40 hours community service, all fees paid, long-term aftercare plan.

Phase IV: After program graduation, complete at least one year of probation or as long as the plea agreement requires.
